





Juli Zeh, born in 1974, studied law and took her PhD in the field of European and international law. This was followed by longer stints in New York and Kraków. Her debut novel Eagles and Angels was an international bestseller, and since then her books have been translated into 35 languages. She has been awarded myriad prizes for her work, including the Carl Amery Literature Prize, the Thomas Mann Prize and the German Order of Merit. But Bracken, the small village in Brandenburg, is not quite as idyllic as she thought. There is no furniture in the house yet, the garden resembles a wilderness, and the bus connection to the district town is a joke. But above all, behind the high garden wall there resides a neighbour who, with his shaved head and right-wing slogans, seems to conform to all the prejudices.







I Want to Be Close to You is her first novel.
