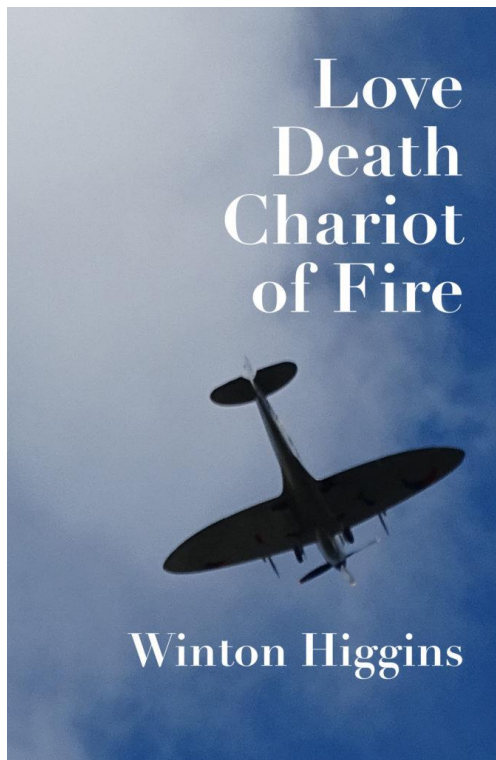

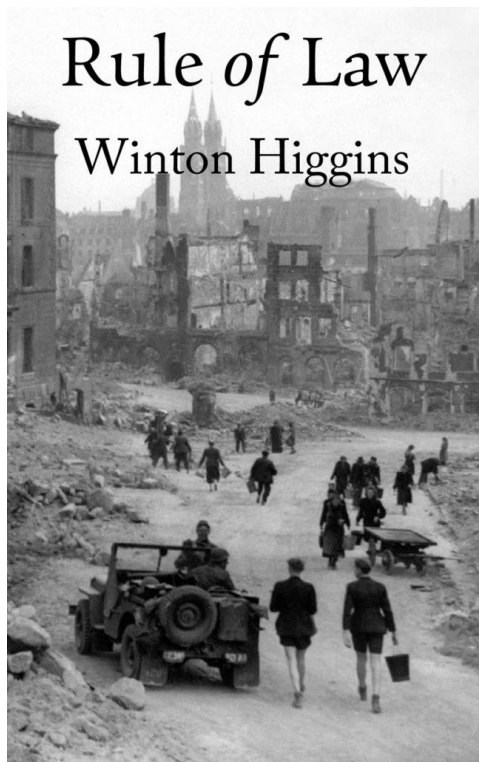

About *Love, Death, Chariot of Fire*: *Love, Death, Chariot of Fire* tells the story of Reg Mitchell, a British aircraft designer who worked for the Southampton aviation company Supermarine from 1916 to 1936 and who designed the Supermarine Spitfire, the fighter plane that won the Battle of Britain and changed the course of the Second World War. Reg's creation is made poignant by not only the collective destruction of war but also the personal destruction of cancer that he attempts to outpace. *Love, Death, Chariot of Fire* is a political and personal drama about overcoming adversity, making a difference and changing the course of history.

About Winton Higgins: Winton Higgins is a writer and academic with degrees from the Universities of London, Stockholm and Sydney. Winton has cultivated a wide range of interests in his intellectual life, including social-democratic theory and practice and genocide studies, with special reference to the Holocaust. He was an associate professor in politics at Macquarie University, Sydney, and an associate in international studies at University of Technology, Sydney. Higgins published an historical novel about the first Nuremberg trial, *Rule of Law*, in 2016 and a Holocaust-themed travel diary, *Journey into Darkness*.

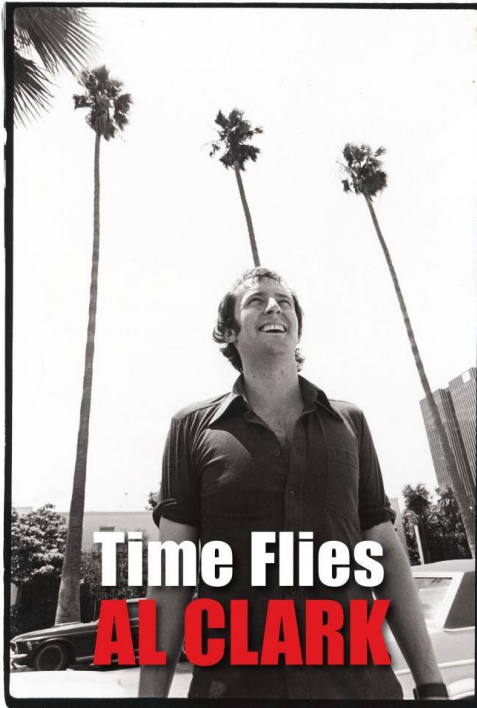

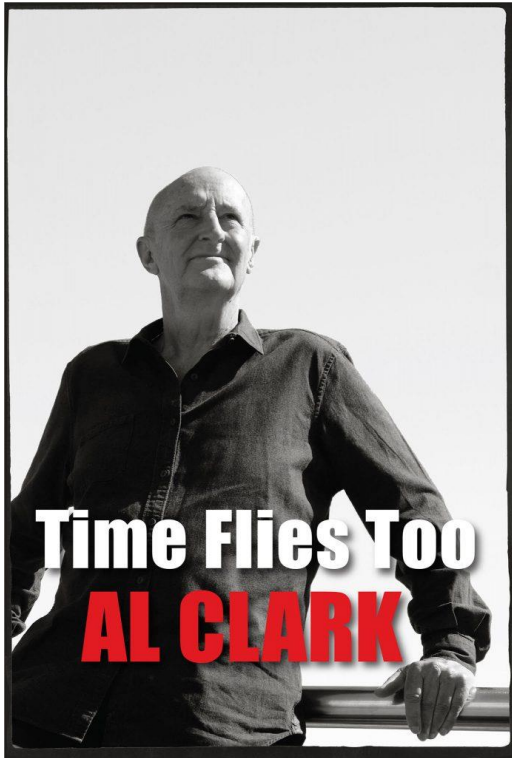

About *Time Flies*: *Time Flies* is an idiosyncratic memoir with a distinctive voice and a sense of the absurd: a wistful, reflective, sometimes comic view of a childhood in a remote mining village in Southern Spain, the dislocating shock of a Scottish boarding school education, and a remarkable introduction to working life in London at *Time Out* then at *Virgin*, both at the peak of their maverick self-confidence. Al Clark was a tireless spokesman for these companies, and an improbable mouthpiece for the Sex Pistols at the time of their greatest fame and vilification, and he later went on to produce numerous notable films, several classics among them.

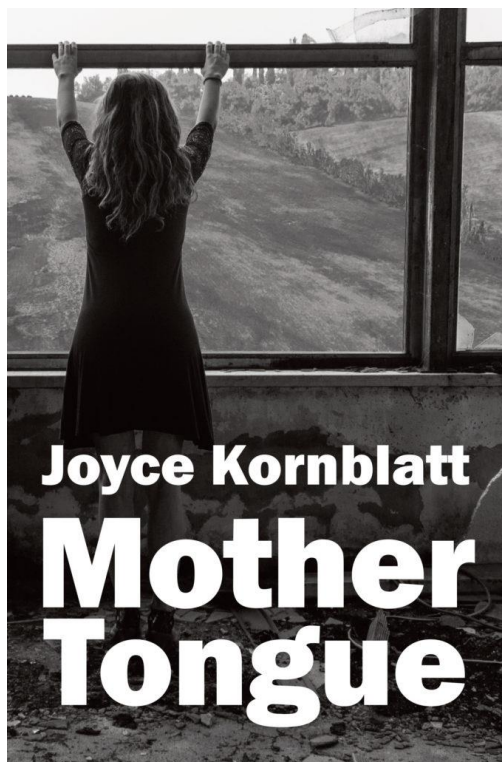

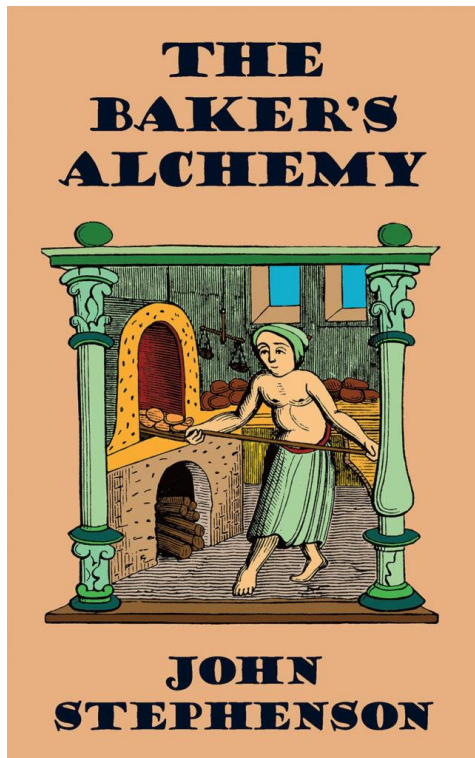

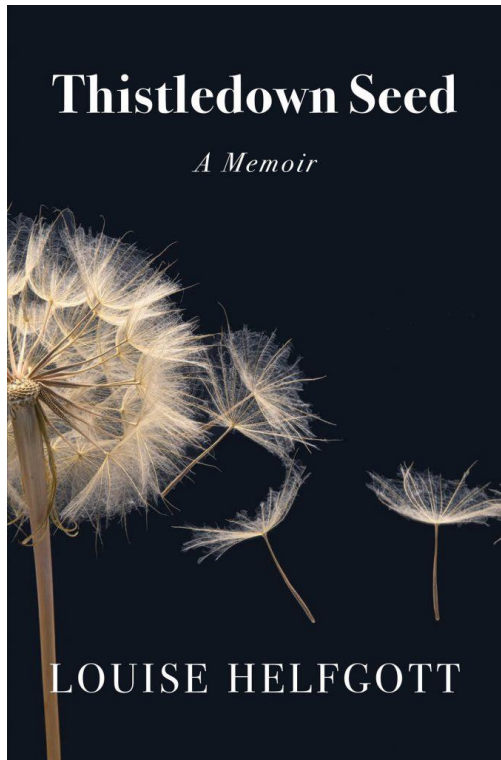

***Thistledown Seed* by Louise Helfgott**



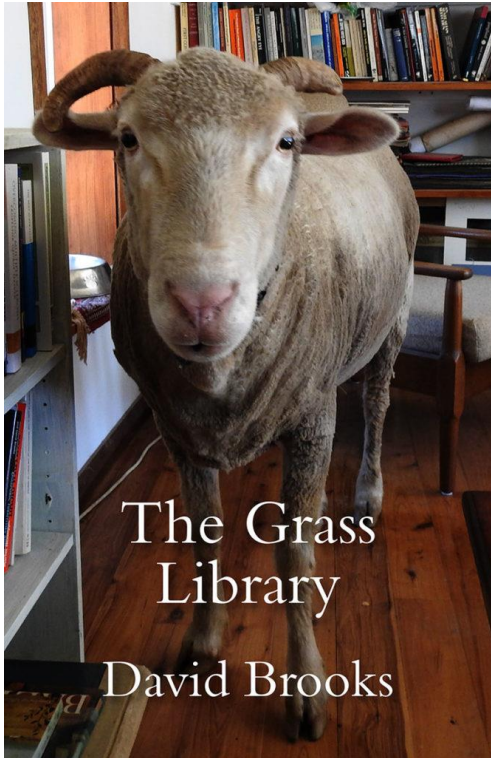

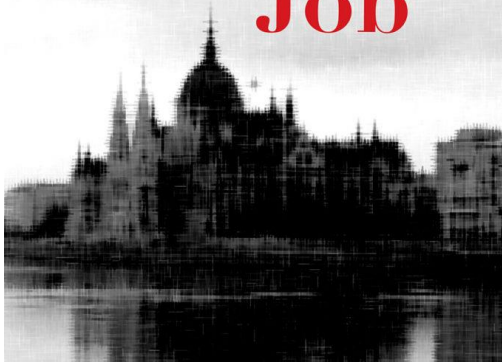

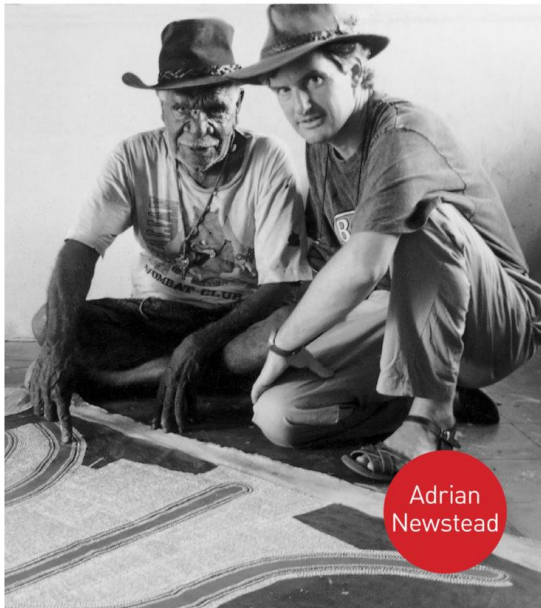
