In an age where 'truth' and 'proof' are hotly contested, it is a useful exercise to go back to the foundations of these ideas. In *Proof*, bestselling author Adam Kucharski explores the tenets that have been central to establishing modern notions of truth - and how we can use them today. Spanning science, politics, philosophy and economics, this is a book that examines the concept of proof from the Medieval Arabic world to the midst of the covid-19 pandemic.

Drawing from Kucharski's background in mathematics and epidemiology, *Proof* shows how we can make better sense of the world around us - and harness that knowledge to improve our ideas and decision-making.

Uncovering the History of Women's Bodies

Helen King

Journey into the complex history of women's bodies - through the womb, hymen, clitoris and breasts

"What is a woman? Why is she not a man?"

Today, we are more aware than ever of the complex relationship between our bodies and our identities. But these are not new questions.

Throughout history, our bodies have been controlled and misunderstood. How was the womb seen as both the most miraculous organ in the body - and as a sewer? Did the clitoris need to be discovered? Is there even such a thing as the hymen? And have breasts always been both maternal and sexual?

How do we tell stories about our bodies? Helen King has been studying the history of the body for forty years, and here she examines the ways in which medicine and religion have played a gatekeeping role over women's organs. Ultimately, she argues that being a woman - and defining a woman - has always been immensely complex and contradictory. What does it mean to live as a body?

Helen King is Professor Emerita of Classical Studies at The Open University. She is a historian of medicine and the body, and has held visiting posts at Gustavus Adolphus College, MN; the Peninsula Medical School; and the universities of Vienna, Texas, Notre Dame and British Columbia. She is also an elected member of the General Synod of the Church of England, where she is vice-chair of the Gender & Sexuality Group. Since her first monograph, *Hippocrates' Woman: Reading the female body in ancient Greece (1988)*, she has published on aspects of gynaecology and obstetrics from classical Greece to the nineteenth century.

From warrior queens and the infamous battle of the 300 to war with Athens, Sparta is a major new history of the world's first superpower


Sparta - its legendary warriors and steadfast resilience are famous throughout the world as a model for toughness, justice and masculinity. The Spartans' reputation as fighters is matched only by their mythic code of honour. Their torch has been carried by footballers and politicians, video games and philosophers alike.

But who really were the Spartans? And what was the driving force behind the rise - and dramatic fall - of Sparta?

Sparta traces the story of Ancient Greece's most iconic city-state, from its humble beginnings as a hamlet in the Peloponnese to its meteoric rise as the foremost military superpower of the Classical world. Andrew Bayliss uncovers the eclectic quirks that set Sparta above its rivals: its famous double monarchy, the harsh methods for raising children as soldiers and the unique role of women in Spartan life.

Sparta was the world's first superpower and its legacy is still shaping popular culture and politics today. This is the story of its rise and fall.

Andrew J. Bayliss is Associate Professor in Greek History at the University of Birmingham. He has taught and studied in Australia, Greece and the UK, and his published works on ancient Greek history include Oath and State in Ancient Greece (2012), The Spartans (2020) and The Spartans: A Very Short Introduction (2022).

The Language Puzzle

How We Talked Our Way out of the Stone Age

Steven Mithen

A groundbreaking new account of prehistory from one of the most esteemed archaeologists working today

The relationship between language, thought and culture is of concern to anyone with an interest in what it means to be human.

The Language Puzzle explains how the invention of words at 1.6 million years ago began the evolution of human language from the ape-like calls of our earliest ancestors to our capabilities of today, with over 6000 languages in the world and each of us knowing over 50,000 words.

Drawing on the latest discoveries in archaeology, linguistics, psychology, and genetics, Steven Mithen reconstructs the steps by which language evolved; he explains how it transformed the nature of thought and culture, and how we talked our way out of the Stone Age into the world of farming and swiftly into today's Digital Age.

While this radical new work is not shy to reject outdated ideas about language, it builds bridges between disciplines to forge a new synthesis for the evolution of language that will find widespread acceptance as a new standard account for how humanity began.

Steven Mithen is Professor of Early Prehistory at the University of Reading. He previously studied at the Slade School of Fine Art and the Universities of Sheffield, York and Cambridge, before joining the University of Reading. An award-winning archaeologist, Steven Mithen specialises in prehistoric hunter-gatherers and the earliest Neolithic farmers, with long-term field projects in southern Jordan and western Scotland. He is a frequent contributor to the London Review of Books, New York Review of Books, New Scientist and the Guardian and has authored over 200 academic articles and books, including The Singing Neanderthals and After the Ice. He was elected as a Fellow of the British Academy in 2004.





An Intimate History of the Viking Age

A new and original history of the Viking Age, told through the objects that defined the lives of the people who lived through it

Imagine a Viking, and a certain image springs to mind: a nameless, faceless warrior, leaping ashore from a longboat, and ready to terrorise the hapless local population of a northern European country.

Yet while such characters define the Viking Age today, they were in the minority. This is the history of the other people who inhabited the medieval Nordic world – not only Norway, Denmark and Sweden, but also Iceland, Greenland, parts of the British Isles, Continental Europe and Russia – a history of a Viking Age filled with real people of different ages, genders and ethnicities, as told through the traces that they left behind, from hairstyles to place names, love-notes to gravestones.

It's also a history of humans on an extraordinarily global stage, spanning the centuries from the edge of the North American continent to the Russian steppes, from the Arctic wastelands to the Byzantine Empire and the Islamic Caliphate.

Eleanor Rosamund Barraclough is a cultural historian, broadcaster and writer based at Durham University, where she is Associate Professor of Medieval History and Literature. A *BBC* New Generation Thinker, she has appeared regularly on radio and television, work which has lead to her variously being knighted with a walrus penis bone, bewitched in Sherwood Forest, chased by imaginary zombies through the basement of the *BBC* and dunked in a hole in the ice in a quest for immortality.

Tracks on the Ocean

How Journeys Became Lines

A trailblazing history of how the marks left on maps tell the story of the world

Maps do not show the world as it really is - they instead show us how we see it, and they are the product of centuries of trading, exploring and conquering. The lines on a map are even more revealing: as records of individual journeys, they cast a light on the minds of travellers through history, and they can help us understand how the modern world was made.

In *Tracks on the Ocean,* Sara Caputo tells how our journeys around the globe became fixed lines on our maps - from Captain Cook's route across the South Seas to the disorientating power of digital technology to reshape societies. The tracks on the ocean, Caputo shows, mark humanity's impact on the planet, whether in the legacy of violence plotted by Christopher Columbus in the New World or in the clouds of exhaust fumes left by ocean liners.

Weaving human history, cartography, literature and climate science, *Tracks on the Ocean* reveals how, on the path to discovery, we have changed the world.

Dr Sara Caputo is a Senior Research Fellow at Magdalen College, Cambridge. A specialist in seventeenth- and eighteenth- century maritime history, she is the winner of the Prince Consort and Thirwell Prize, as well as the Boydell and Brewer Prize for her research on the Royal Navy. She has been a Visiting Fellow in Germany, California and at the National Maritime Museum in Greenwich. She lives and works in Cambridge. *Tracks on the Ocean* was awarded the Ideas Prize for non-fiction.



Here, historian and dog lover Chris Pearson reveals how the shifting fortunes of dogs holds a mirror to our changing society. There are countless ways that dogs aid us - sheepdogs guard flocks and mountain passes, rescue dogs rush into disaster zones and service dogs help us live fuller lives. Chris Pearson is Reader in Twentieth Century History at the University of Liverpool. A specialist in humananimal history, his work has appeared in leading academic journals, and a book, *Dogopolis: How Dogs and Humans Made Modern London, New York and Paris.* He is currently researching the lives of Indian street dogs in a project funded by the Wellcome Trust, and he lives in Chester with his family and his Bedlington-Whippet, Cassie.



Many of them will want to learn more about the enigmatic man behind the classic books filled with mysterious courts and monstrous insects. Who, exactly, was Franz Kafka?

Karolina Watroba, the first Germanist ever elected as a Fellow of Oxford 's All Souls College, will tell Kafka's story beyond the boundaries of language, time and space, travelling from the Prague of Kafka's birth through the work of contemporary writers in East Asia, whose awardwinning novels are in part homages to the great man himself.

Metamorphoses is a non-chronological journey through Kafka's life, drawing together literary scholarship with the responses of his readers through time. It is a both an exploration of Kafka's life and an entirely new way of approaching literary history.

Karolina Watroba is a research fellow at All Souls College, University of Oxford, where she works on modern literature and film across eight European languages and beyond, with a focus on German, English, and Polish.

Beauty, make up, art, power: An alternative history of the Renaissance told by the women behind the paintings


As the Renaissance visual world became populated by female nudes by the likes of Michelangelo and Titian, a vibrant literary scene of beauty tips emerged - fuelling debates about cosmetics and adornment, with answers for worries about everything from podgy upper arms, smelly armpits, droopy breasts, stretch marks and bad breath.

Telling the stories of courtesans, artists, actors and writers rebelling against the strictures of their time, when burgeoning colonialism gave rise to increasingly sinister evaluations of bodies and skin colour, this book puts beauty culture into the frame. It also includes some Renaissance recipes for beauty products to try at home.

It will make you question your ideas about your own body, and ask: why are women often so critical of their appearance? What do we stand to lose, but also to gain, from beauty culture? What is the relationship between looks and power?

Professor Jill Burke is a historian of the body and its visual representation, focusing on Italy and Europe 1400-1700. She is the Principal Investigator of a Royal Society funded project, 'Renaissance Goo', at the University of Edinburgh, working with a soft matter scientist to remake Renaissance cosmetic and skincare recipes. It is part of a wider investigation into how people in the Renaissance tried to look good - how they sought to change their bodies, faces and hairstyles to meet beauty ideals.

Diaries, sketchbooks, common-places, notebooks, ledgers and ships' logs: how the blank book changed the way we think and helped us change the world


Notebooks are everywhere, yet we rarely notice them and never stop to consider where they came from or how they work. We use them every day to scribble notes, remember dates, and list our chores, but an empty notebook has limitless potential; it gives us the space to reflect on our innermost thoughts, to untangle our knottiest problems, or to draw out ground-breaking new discoveries. Without their notebooks, Isaac Newton, Albert Einstein and Pablo Picasso - and a legion of other writers, artists and scientists - would never have achieved what they did.

Roland Allen follows a trail of ideas, revealing how the notebook came to be our most durable tool for thinking. He shows how the blank book transformed life in Italy - prompting the rise of international banking and the intellectual advances of the Renaissance before becoming Europe's most versatile information technology. Artists, writers, scientists, and engineers all came to rely on theirs; but so did fishermen, sailors, cooks, and thieves. *The Notebook* tells their stories, celebrating the infinite variety of our notebooks and their uses.

Referring to hundreds of fascinating examples, from 1300 to the present day, and drawing on the knowledge of a host of experts, Allen's stories will ensure that you look at - and use - your humble notebook in a whole new way.

Roland Allen is a publisher and author who lives in Hove. He studied at Manchester University and has worked for years in the book trade; he has written about subjects as diverse as bicycles and bread, kept a diary for decades, and enjoys stationery a little too much.

With their draped suits, suede creepers and immaculately greased hair, the Teddy Boys defined a new era for a generation of teenagers raised on a diet of drab clothes, Blitz playgrounds and tinned dinners.

From the Edwardian origins of their fashion to the tabloid fears of delinquency, drunkenness and disorder, the story of the Teds throws a fascinating light on a British society that was still reeling from the Second World War. In the 1950s, working-class teenagers found a way of asserting themselves in how they dressed, spoke and socialised on the street. When people saw Teds, they stepped aside.



The House Divided

Sunni, Shia and the Making of the Middle East

Barnaby Rogerson

A fresh look at the past, present and future of a conflict that lies at the heart of the Middle East

At the heart of the Middle East, with its regional conflicts and proxy wars, is a 1400-year-old schism, between Sunni and Shia. To understand this divide and its modern resonances, we need to revisit its origins, which go back to the death of the Prophet Muhammad in 632, the accidental coup that set aside the claims of his son Ali, and the slaughter of Ali's own son Husayn at Kerbala. These events, known to every Muslim, have created a slender fault line in the Middle East.

The House Divided follows these narratives from the first Sunni and Shia caliphates, through the medieval caliphates and empires of the Arabs, Persians and Ottomans. It shows how a complex range of identities and rivalries – religious, ethnic and national – have shaped the contemporary Middle East, jolted by the seismic shift of the Iranian Revolution of 1979. Rogerson's original approach takes the modern chessboard of nation states and looks at each from its perspective of oil wells, mountains, minorities and particular history. It is vital, he contends, to both understand and empathise with a conflict that matters not only in the Middle East, but to the world at large.

Barnaby Rogerson has been travelling the Islamic world for the last forty years, first as a young man writing guidebooks, then as a journalist, and finally as a writer of histories. 


The secret history of the body's most misunderstood organ: the gut





Part-biography, part-political thriller, The Unaccountability Machine is a rousing exposé of how management failures lead organisations to make catastrophic errors

When we avoid taking a decision, what happens to it?

In *The Unaccountability Machine*, Dan Davies examines why markets, institutions and even governments systematically generate outcomes that everyone involved claims not to want. In answering that question he casts new light on the writing of Stafford Beer, a legendary economist who was arguing as far back as the 1950s that we should regard organisations as artificial intelligences, capable of taking decisions that are distinct from the intentions of their members.

Management cybernetics was Beer's science of applying self-regulation in organisational settings, but it was largely ignored – with the result being the political and economic crises that that we see today. With his signature blend of cynicism and journalistic rigour, Davies looks at what's gone wrong, and what might have been, had the world listened to Stafford Beer when it had the chance.


An entertaining and anecdotal illustrated history of flags

This captivating history of flags explains their origins and hidden meanings, taking a chatty but always entertaining path through this universal subject.

Each chapter starts with a well-known flag - such as the French tricolor, where the white in the centre (the monarchy) is kept in check by the red and blue of the Parisian flag representing the people - and shows how that flag led, for example, to the red, white and green tricolor of Italy - thought in turn to represent the red of struggle, the white of the Alps and the green of Italy's lush vegetation. And then to a host of other tricolors in different parts of the world. Many of the over 200 colour illustrations feature alternative versions of existing flags the flags that might have been - such as the red Canadian maple leaf between two bands of blue, representing the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

First published in Ukrainian six months before the start of the Ukrainian-Russian War, this entertaining, chatty and very likeable history of flags was written by Ukrainian businessman and ex-cabinet minister Dmytro Dubilet as a lockdown project. It sold 5,000 copies in Ukranian in its first 2 months.

Dmytro Dubilet is a businessman and politician. Born and raised in Dnipro, Ukraine, he studied at the University of Kyiv and London Business School. In 2017 he co-founded the IT company Fintech Band which then launched the mobile-only Monobank. In 2019 he was appointed Minister of the Cabinet Ministers in the Ukrainian cabinet.
